#### The Parable of the Fig Tree

Theirs is just one of the thousands of stories of loss and brokenness amid the ashes of the Los Angeles wildfires.

The Washington Post just last January told the story of John and Gail Wirth, who lost their home in Pacific Palisades. Gail is an actress who had once been part of the cast of <u>Saturday Night Live</u> and has recently been doing voice-over work in several animated series. John is a writer-producer of the series <u>Remington Steele</u> and <u>Nash Bridges</u>. Both 72, they had lived in Pacific Palisades since 1995 where they raised their two daughters. "We lost our homes and community and lifestyle," John said. "But we also lost our imagined future. I thought we would live there forever."

Gail and John were among the lucky ones: they managed to escape the fire with their two dogs, a few photo albums and a couple bags of clothes along with things they hastily grabbed. They've settled in a new, smaller house a few miles away. The stark white walls and empty closets are constant reminders of everything they lost. Just a couple weeks before the fire, they had received notice that their insurance was about to be cancelled – but they're covered for the loss.

Losing their house was heartbreaking, but more devastating was the loss of "the 72 years of stuff" they had gathered, gifted, handed down, cherished. Lost were archives of their television and movie work. All that filled their little house reflected who they were, what they value, moments in time, access to memories.

Forty years ago, high school sweethearts John and Gail Wirth came to Los Angeles from Sioux Falls, SD. They had nothing except each other. They built a home together. And now, they're building again. Shortly after they moved into their new place, the doorbell rang. Their first guests: their daughter, son-in-law and grandkids, and their dogs. And for a time, the house was too full to notice the white walls, the empty closets and all the ghosts of a lost home.

Compared to the California wildfires, the parable of the fig tree mirrors the fragility of our lives, that our struggles and challenges sometimes have the force to uproot our lives in an instant. But with the compassion and love of friends, and God's constant care we can rebuild, reconnect, refashion the fig trees of our lives with a growing sense of peace and awareness of God's providential attention. The life of God is always about starting over, about re-creation, growth and discovery. It's about the grace to make things right and whole again.

#### **Becoming Catholic OCIA/RCIA**

Period of Purification and Enlightenment
The period of Purification and Enlightenment takes
place during the season of Lent and immediately
precedes the initiation of the catechumens and
candidates into the Catholic Church at the Easter
Vigil. It is a period of spiritual preparation and
reflection, cantered upon the process of purification
and conversion.

Scrutinies

The scrutinies are celebrated during the period of Purification and Enlightenment on the third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of Lent. They are rites meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect, and to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. #### WHERE DID WE GET THE STATIONS OF THE CROSS?

Until the Moslem invasion of the Holy Land in the tenth century, Christians (Catholics) regularly undertook pilgrimages to Biblical locations, especially to Jerusalem where Jesus was arrested, tried, sentenced and killed...and rose on Easter.

Christians (Catholics & Orthodox) who lived there had developed a path through the holy city called the "Via Dolorosa" – the Way (or Road) of Tears – that approximated the journey of Jesus from the Roman Governor's palace to the site of capital punishment (Mount Calvary). From there it was a short way to what was believed to be the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea, who donated it for Jesus' burial. Today it is called the Church of the Holy Sepulcher.

Devout Christians came to the holy city to walk the path Jesus took, along which certain locations were set aside to mark various events that may (or may not) have taken place on that fateful Friday.

To afford passage for such a pilgrimage would have been expensive but it had become worth the cost to Christians in that time. However, when the Moslems (now Muslims) controlled the lands of the Bible, such travel/pilgrimage was almost impossible, as well as dangerous. Thus, the Crusades, which were fought on and off for a couple hundred years.

Catholics back home in Europe, prevented from making the pilgrimage to the "Via Dolorosa," started developing in their dioceses, parishes or monasteries/convents a devotion that could be prayed anytime that incorporated some of the prayers and "stations" that had been part of the Jerusalem experience. This did not gain acceptance universally in all dioceses or parishes, but began in random locations, so there would be a French, or English, or Italian version, and initially, these stations were constructed outside on church land, or through the parish cemetery. Eventually permanent images, carved in stone or statuary or mosaics depicting a certain scene were installed. In certain countries, there were as many as 20-30 "stations!" Eventually the Church decided that the number would be 14; recently adding in some places a 15<sup>th</sup> station: the Resurrection.

Because their purpose was to remind the faithful of the slow, deliberate journey Jesus took to his death, the stations were always "walked" by those participating. Once standardized, parishes took to installing them <u>inside</u> the parish church, mostly around the perimeter. Only with the advent of the printing press, did it become a devotion that could be prayed privately as well as publicly.

Though some of the traditional stations have no foundation in Scripture (for example, Veronica, the number of falls) most do or are presumed because of the nature of the story (like, Sentencing by Pilate) or other historical information.



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
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
